*There was one question that needed to be followed up on about retained earnings funds- we emailed out a response to the Board on 4/17/23. See below for answer:

"The City of Sandy's budget management approach is "expenditure control budgeting," which allows general fund departments the same budget authority and responsibility as the directors of enterprise funds. The chief features of this approach are that the general fund departments are allocated general revenues (property taxes, franchise fees, state shared revenues, etc.) and the departments can carry over budget savings from one biennium to the next. Allocating revenue and allowing departments to keep what they do not spend helps eliminate the "spend it or lose it" incentive and similar budget games apparent in other budget management approaches. Like the enterprise funds, general fund departments have more flexibility and ownership in the preparation of their budgets and in planning for one-time expenses (equipment and capital). Of course, any carryover balances also must be used in ways that are consistent with Council's priorities and should not be used for ongoing commitments such as staff costs."

Dear Parks Board, January 10, 2023 I am writing to provide input to your consideration of pickle ball facilities in Sandy Presented options and my comments include: Converting existing basketball courts for basketball and pickleball use in Tupper, Timberline or Barlow Parks. Sandy's park playgrounds are primarily designed for use by kids under age eight. There are few facilities in our parks, other than these basketball courts, for kids over age eight. I don't believe it helps our situation to turn these limited opportunities for kids over to pickleball users, who are in general, an older population. That will create conflict between user and age groups and should be avoided. Construct pickleball courts in one or more of the future parks planned in the Master Plan Constitute picked activities in other of more of the dutile parks prainted in the waster Plan (Deer Point, Ponder Lane, and/or Champion Way). This is probably the most promising alternative. I am a strong advocate for developing more of our future parks for active recreation, rather than just open-grass "multi-use" fields that need to be mowed. Pickleball noise is an important isse that needs to be addressed. Similar to dog parks, it is best to build pickleball courts, before all the homes around it get built. Building them adjacent to Hwy 26 or Hwy 211 and away from homes, are also prudent, to deal with noise issues. For that reason, the far side (to be acquired section) of Deer Point, or the Ponder Lane Parks would lend themselves better to Pickleball. I will again point out that I don't believe they have adequate parking for Ponder Lane. Another shorter-term option to consider is working with the OTSD to reline/repaint/revise the High School tennis courts. This would allow them to be used by both citizens and students. While development of pickleball in these parks will take 1-2 years, I think that is preferable to introducing conflict and reducing availability of our basketball courts to the many kids that use them. Finally, I am hoping that we can be looking for property to purchase for a ballfield complex that can provide for soccer, baseball, softball, and pickleball fields/courts. We land-banked Bornstedt Park for over 5 years before we started construction. Focusing on flatter land outside City limits and/or the UGB/UGR will reduce purchasing costs. FINANCIAL SUSTAINABILITY DEPARTMENT POLICY

Purpose

The City of Sandy Parks and Recreation Department's Financial Sustainability Policy intends to create organizational resilience by way of logical, intentional, and thoughtful guidelines for investment and spending decisions. The strategy encourages tax investment and revenue generation strategies and practices that are fair, equitable, and responsible. This policy is necessary to ensure the Department's financial stability in both the near and long term.

The Financial Sustainability Policy will guide investment and spending choices as the City responds to economic realities, growth competing priorities, demographic shifts and evolving community needs, and climate threats.

Policy Statement

In alignment with the City Council's 2021-2023 Goals [Goals 5: To Maintain financial strength and sustainability; Action a: Diversify revenue sources, analyze new revenue streams, and look at cost recovery where possible] the Department's Financial Sustainability Policy grounds cost recovery expectations and the spending of taxpayer dollars in a philosophical underpinning that affirms a commitment to equitable investment, financial discipline, and long-term fiscal health.

The bi-annual City of Sandy budget ultimately determines the amount of taxpayer support that can be made available for park and recreation services which results in understanding the degree to which subsidy investment can be made and to which services, and the degree to which user fees will be assessed and to which services.

Cost Recovery/Subsidy

Cost recovery refer to offsetting the costs (expenses) of delivering services by way of revenues generated from fees and charges, sponsorships, donations, grants, and other alternative revenue streams. Alternatively, subsidy represent a tax source. It is granted by a governmental entity; typically to remove some type of burden, and often considered to be in the overall interest of the public. It is also given to promote a social good or an economic polity.

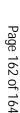

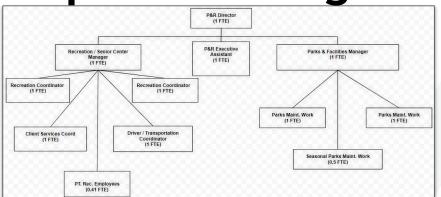

BACKGROUND / CONTEXT:

GENERAL OVERVIEW OF THE PARKS AND RECREATION DEPARTMENT

The Parks and Recreation Department was formed as a traditional parks and recreation department in November 2021. Prior to this, the maintenance and construction of parks and trails resided under the Public Works Department, while Recreation, Senior Services, Parks Planning, and Special Events programs and services were managed under a Community Services Department.

As currently structured, the Parks and Recreation Department provides recreation programming, special/community events, senior programs and services, and the maintenance of City facilities, parks, trails, and open spaces.

The creation of a new department was an opportunity to build a department that could expand and strategically provide parks and recreation for the community of Sandy that is responsive its anticipated population growth. This opportunity also incorporated hiring and developing a new staff team and reopening the Community Center as COVID restrictions were lifted. This work also meant hiring and training a team to get back to pre-pandemic staffing levels.

Over the course of a year the department worked to hire 6 employees to rebuild and reinvent the senior/recreation division. In Parks, the division was slightly restructured changing a lead position to a manager position, requiring the parks/facilities manager to hold more professional certifications, such as Certified Playground Inspection Certification (CPSI), and a pesticide applicators license. Parks also hired a replacement for an employee that had retired.

In summary, of the current 10.91 Full Time Equivalents (FTE's) in the Parks and Recreation Department, 7.91 are new in the last year.

The Parks and Recreation team consists of:

- 10.91 Full Time Equivalents (FTE's)
 - 1 Parks and Recreation Director
 - o 5 employees in the recreation and senior services division,
 - 1 executive assistant,
 - o 3 full-time parks/facilities crew members, and
 - Approximately 0.91 FTE for part-time and seasonal employees
 - seasonal park employee (April August), and recreation employees (umps, coaches, and building monitors).

Parks System

The parks system has a total of almost 280 acres. Below is a breakdown by park category. Mini-parks provide basic recreation on small lots within residential areas serving an area within 5-minutes walking time (approximately ¼ mile) from neighbors. Mini-parks are typically less than one acre in size (¼ to ¾ acre). Neighborhood parks are located within approximately 5-10 minute walking time (approximately ¼-½ mile) from local residences and are generally 2-5 acres in size. Community parks are typically 10-30 acres, and the park appeals to the entire community, serving an area within approximately 15 minutes driving time or three miles. Natural or open space can range from small parcels to large properties of more than 100 acres and typically serve the entire community. Special use can include waterfront parks, boat ramps, memorials, historic sites, or a single dedicated purpose. Special use parks have a community or regional draw.

The Department's mission is to engage and strengthen community belonging by developing and maintaining safe, clean, and accessible parks as well as providing inclusive and diverse programs and services.

As the Department continues to grow and evolve our vision is to advance Sandy's parks, programs, services, and policies while striving to be a leader in the field of Parks and Recreations and a pillar to the community of Sandy.

UPDATE ON COUNCIL GOALS AS IT PERTAINS TO PARKS AND RECREATION

There are several Council Goals that guided the work of the Parks and Recreation Department. An update on the progress of these goals is listed below.

GOAL #5: Maintain financial strength and sustainability

 Actions: Diversify revenue sources, analyze new revenue streams, look at cost recovery where possible

- Cost recovery workshop with Parks Board and City Council held in December 2022.
- Parks SDC methodology and rates updated.

GOAL #8: Expand recreation opportunities that align with community needs

- Actions: Appoint a committee to guide the next steps for the Community Campus and aquatics
 - Community Campus Council Subcommittee established and guided staff on exploring options for aquatics and recreational facilities at the campus.
 - Community Campus Council Subcommittee's role will also include involvement on the Community Campus Park Project Advisory Committee
 - Pool Exploratory Task Force created, completed assessment, and provided recommendations.
- Actions: Complete the parks and trails master plan
 - Completed and adopted by Council including 2022 amendment.
 - Parks SDCs and Fee-in-Lieu fees were updated.
- Actions: Develop a plan for the Community Campus
 - o In progress.
 - RFP issued for community campus park improvements. Landscape consultants will create preferred park concepts through additional public engagement. Break ground tentatively scheduled for late winter or early spring of 2024.

HIGH-LEVEL REVIEW OF ACCOMPLISHMENTS AND GOALS FULFILLED FOR 2021-2022

The Department had a goal setting session with the Parks Board in January 2022. The Parks Board provided input to help guide the Department in establishing priorities. The Department goals for 2021-2022 aligned with goals set forth by the Council.

- Community Campus IN PROGRESS
 - Pool Exploratory Task Force (PETF) completed work in Jan. 2022

- A Request for Proposal (RFP) for dry side / wet side & park Improvements was advertised.
 - A combined RFP produced zero submittals. In Oct. 2022, a revised RFP with a standalone park improvement was advertised. The city received 4 proposals. A selection committee selected the preferred consultant, and a contract was awarded to Lango Hansen Landscape Architects. A second contract was awarded to American Ramp Company for the design of a skate park and pump track.
- Staff has started the work to complete the connector trail from CC to Sandy River. Funding included a Recreational Trails Program Grant. It is anticipated that we will break ground sometime in late Spring, early summer.
- Council approved moving forward with Park Improvements first and the front portion of the community campus visioning to continue into 2023-2025.
- Funding sources include Park SDC's, and \$3 million cash in urban renewal from the original purchase of the property.
 - A formal decision to dedicate the \$3 million is needed by SURA.
- Initiated cost recovery work and department-wide budget analysis IN PROGRESS / estimated completion date March/April 2023
 - Create a department master fee schedule
 - Develop an adjusted fee schedule based on cost recovery results
- Created an Integrated Pest Management Policy (IPM) COMPLETED / Jan. 11, 2023
 - Built off of existing Pesticide Policy
 - Created better cultural practices, promoting biodiversity throughout the parks system
 - Parks crew to become Pesticide Licensed (and/or an apprentice)
- Capital Improvement Projects
 - o Meinig Park COMPLETED
 - Details: improvements completed; electrical fixed and upgraded, heated bathrooms for year round use, successfully restored pervious asphalt parking lot
 - Completed
 - Cost: \$22,251.02
 - Sandy Bluff Park IN-PROGRESS
 - Details: complete dog park improvements to allow for ADA access, repair stairs into the dog park, create a walking path around the perimeter of the dog park, add two shelters to the park property.

Subject: Update Cascade Creek Subdivision

DECISION TO BE MADE:

This is an update regarding Cascade Creek Mixed-Use Development. No decision is required.

PURPOSE / OBJECTIVE:

The Parks and Recreation Director will provide an update on Cascade Creek Development. This development was reviewed by the Parks Board at the Sept. 14, 2022 meeting.

BACKGROUND / CONTEXT:

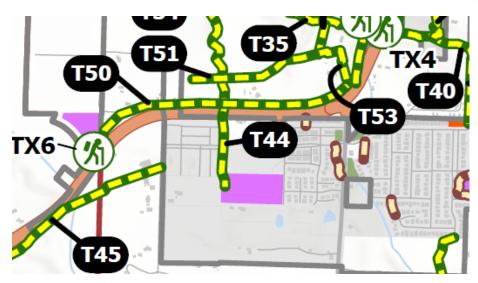
At the Sept. 14, 2023 Parks and Trails Advisory Board meeting staff presented to PTAB about a proposed development called Cascade Creek Apartments.

VICINITY MAP



The Parks Board discussed the option of Fee-in-Lieu of parkland dedication as well the future development meeting the trail connection requirements as listed in the Parks and Trails Master Plan. The Parks Board deemed Fee-in-Lieu of parkland dedication because the development of Cascade Creek Apartments is directly north of Bornstedt Park. Existing Bornstedt Park satisfies the proposed park system requirements. Furthermore, Trail 44, shown in the Parks Master Plan

(p. 55, Map 14) is listed as a 5 foot path. According to the Development Services Director this can be satisfied by constructing the sidewalk on the east side of the Village Blvd. right-of-way.



The Parks Board sent a memo to the Planning Commission accepting fee-in-lieu of parkland dedication. The memo also stated that the Parks Board supported the option to establish a development agreement to build certain amenities as listed in the Bornstedt Park Phase 2 master plan. The memo submitted to the Planning Commission is attached to this staff report.

From the updated transmittal the applicant BCRA submitted an application to construct a mixed-use development that includes a total of 78 multi-family residential units and 10 office spaces. The proposal consists of 4 multi-family residential buildings to the south of Cascadia Village Drive and 2 mixed-use office/residential buildings to the north of Cascadia Village Drive, as well as associated parking, landscaping, common open spaces, and roadway improvements. Please see attached Transmittal for additional information. For reference the civil plans are also attached.

KEY CONSIDERATIONS / ANALYSIS:

Due to the proximity of Bornstedt Park, and because the 2022 Parks and Trails Master Plan does not list a proposed future park in the region of the city, Fee-in-Lieu of parkland dedication is still recommended.

BUDGET IMPACT:

The Council is re-visiting the newly adopted Fee-in-Lieu rate. They are considering the option of reducing it from \$869,242 to \$443,621 cost per acre.

Fee-in-Lieu is estimated as follows. The formula is acres = proposed units x (persons/unit) x 0.0068. For the 78 units, multi-family, acres = $78 \times 2 \times 0.0068 = 1.0608$ acres. The fee-in-lieu per acre is currently adopted at \$869,242.

1.0608 acres multiplied by \$869,242 equates to \$922,091 payment of fee-in-lieu of parkland dedication.

If the Fee-In-Lieu is reduced to \$443,621 cost per acre, the FIL would equate to \$470,593.

DECISION TO BE MADE:

Whether to support Fee-in-lieu of land dedication for "Cascade Creek Apartments 38272 and 38330 Highway 211"

PURPOSE / OBJECTIVE:

- 1. Review Cascade Creek Apartments application and evaluate if the Parks Board supports Fee-in-Lieu of parkland dedication.
- 2. Review the option of a development agreement to add park amenities to Bornstedt Park.

BACKGROUND / CONTEXT:

This is the first time that the Parks Board has reviewed Cascade Creek Apartments subdivision application and provided formal comments about whether to support a fee-in-lieu of land dedication.

Location of Cascade Creek Apartments:



Applicant Zac Baker whose project is the Cascade Creek Apartments and the City of Sandy Planning Department held a pre-application conference meeting on April 20, 2022. Attached is the pre-application conference information. After the Pre-Application Conference, pre-application notes were supplied. Attachment B contains Pre-Application Conference Notes.

Page 7 of 11 contains notes pertaining to parkland and open space.

"Per SDC 17.86.10 Minimum Parkland Dedication Requirements, the project would need to provide 0.64 acres for parks (74 units x 2 persons/unit x 0.0043 = 0.6364 rounded to 0.64 acres)." Note: the 0.0043 may be modified depending on when the applicant submits the land use application per the fixed goal post rule and when the new codification occurs to Sandy Municipal Code Section 17.86.10. Using the updated code the new minimum parkland dedication requirements are roughly 1.0 acre (74 units x 2 persons/unit x 0.0068 = 1.0 acre)

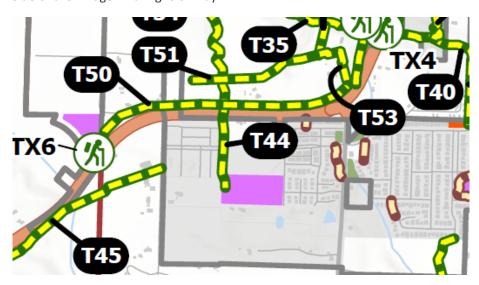
Page 7 also contains information regarding fee-in-lieu. "Section 17.86.40 details that Cash In-Lieu of Dedication is at the city's discretion. Based on the adopted per acre fee in lieu amount (\$241,000/acre), the parks fee in lieu is \$154,240 if paid in total prior to final plat approval. If 50 percent is paid and the remaining 50 percent deferred, \$98,050 is required prior to final plat approval with the remaining \$98,050 divided between the number of lots proposed. Fees are subject to change." These calculations use the previous acre per person park land dedication factor of 0.0043, the updated acre per person listed in the Sandy Municipal Code is now 0.0068.

Therefore, the fee-in-lieu will actually increase slightly due to the updated code change. Rough estimates for fee-in-lieu based on the factors listed above are approximately \$241,000. Furthermore, the Council is reviewing an increase to the FIL rates and depending on when the developer submits their land use application will in turn affect the rate at which a fee-in-lieu is assessed.

Also found in the pre-application notes, "development shall include a pedestrian walkway in a public easement that bisects the proposed multi-family development south of Cascadia Village Drive and connects Cascadia Village Drive to Bornstedt Park." (p.7, pre-application notes)

KEY CONSIDERATIONS / ANALYSIS:

The future development of Cascade Creek Apartments is directly north of Bornstedt Park. Existing Bornstedt Park satisfies the proposed park system requirements. Furthermore, Trail 44, shown in the Parks Master Plan (p. 55, Map 14) is listed as a 5 foot path. According to the Development Services Director this can be satisfied by constructing the sidewalk on the east side of the Village Blvd. right-of-way.



According to Sandy Municipal Code Section 17.86.40 - Fee in lieu of dedication (A.)(B.) states the City shall accept FIL of dedication if the land area proposed to be dedicated is not identified in Map 8, and Map 14. The closest future proposed park is NP6, Barlow Trail Park (2022 Parks and Trails Master Plan, p.45, Map 8). Attached is a memo from Kelly O'Neil, Development Services Director expanding on information found in the code.

SDC Credits / Development Agreement:

Considerations should include a discussion if the Parks Board would like to request that the developer and the Parks and Recreation Department work towards a development agreement to explore the option of partnering with the developer to install a new playground, basketball court, or potentially a restroom. This is a separate process than FIL and parkland dedication and could result in SDC credits to the developer.

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends a fee-in-lieu of parkland dedication due to the existing proximity of Bornstedt Park, and because the 2022 Parks and Trails Master Plan does not list a proposed future park in that region of the city.

Staff recommends the Parks Board submit a memo to the Planning Division accepting fee-in-lieu of parkland dedication. If desired, the memo should also include a list of amenities that the Department should pursue regarding a development agreement, with the option of SDC credits if the developer and the City work together on a development plan to provide additional amenities at Bornstedt Park.

BUDGETARY IMPACT:

Fee-in-Lieu is estimated as follows. The formula is acres = proposed units x (persons/unit) x 0.0068. For the 74 units, assuming single family homes, acres = $74 \times 2 \times 0.0068 = 1.0$ acres. The fee-in-lieu would be \$241,000 (1.0 acres multiplied by \$241,000).

SUGGESTED MOTION LANGUAGE:

I move that the Parks board submit a memo stating that we recommend fee-in-lieu of parkland dedication, and that memo should include the Parks Board's desires to explore the option of a development agreement to add amenities to Bornstedt Park.

I am sending this communication on behalf of the Parks & Trails Advisory Board.

The board met on Sept. 14, 2022 and reviewed the proposed development Cascade Creek Apartments located at 38272 and 38330 Highway 211.

The Parks Board reviewed the proposed development and are recommending two items.

- 1) Acceptance of fee in lieu of parkland dedication
- 2) The Parks Board supports the Parks Department in exploring the option to establish a development agreement to build certain amenities as listed in the Bornstedt Park Phase 2 master plan.

The Parks Board recommends a fee-in-lieu of parkland due to the proximity of Bornstedt Park and because the existing park satisfies the proposed park system requirements as listed in the Parks and Trails Master Plan. The Parks Board also supports the development of a sidewalk on the east side of village blvd. right-of-way to meet the trail requirements of Trail 44 as listed in the Parks and Trails Master Plan.

At this time, an official recommendation was not possible due to a lack of a quorum. If necessary, the Parks Board will reconvene to supply an official recommendation.

Bornstedt Park Phase 2

Phase 1 is complete and includes a looped path, splash pad, playground, picnic tables, a community garden, and two picnic shelters. As depicted in Figure 9 below, Phase 2 will include a half-sized basketball court, viewing mound, a community center, and parking, and half street improvements along the north and west sides. This park offers the only splash pad in the city, and even without the planned parking lot, there is ample street parking. These factors combine to make this a destination park and the city should consider including a plumbed restroom as surrounding development continues and use intensifies.

The applicant, BCRA, submitted an application on behalf of the owner, DPS LLC, to construct a mixed-use development that includes a total of 78 multi-family residential units and 10 office spaces. The vicinity map is on page 2. The proposal consists of four (4) multi-family residential buildings to the south of Cascadia Village Drive and two (2) mixed-use office/residential buildings to the north of Cascadia Village Drive, as well as associated parking, landscaping, common open space, and roadway improvements. Cascadia Village Drive and Pine Street will be extended through the site, Village Blvd. will be widened, and frontage improvements will be completed on Highway 211. The applicant is also requesting a major partition to reconfigure the subject lots and the following four (4) variances:

- Type III Variance to Sections 17.100.180(A), 17.84.50(E.2), and 17.84.50(J.3) to not provide 150 feet between intersections for Pine Street north and south of Cascadia Village Drive.
- 2. Type III Variance to Section 17.100.120(B) to exceed the 400-foot maximum block length on the west side of Pine Street between Sequoia Street and Cascadia Village Drive.
- 3. Type III Special Variance to Section 17.90.160(D) to not provide 8-foot offsets every 20 feet on all six (6) buildings.
- 4. Type III Variance to Tree Retention requirements in accordance with Section 17.102.70.

SITE PLAN

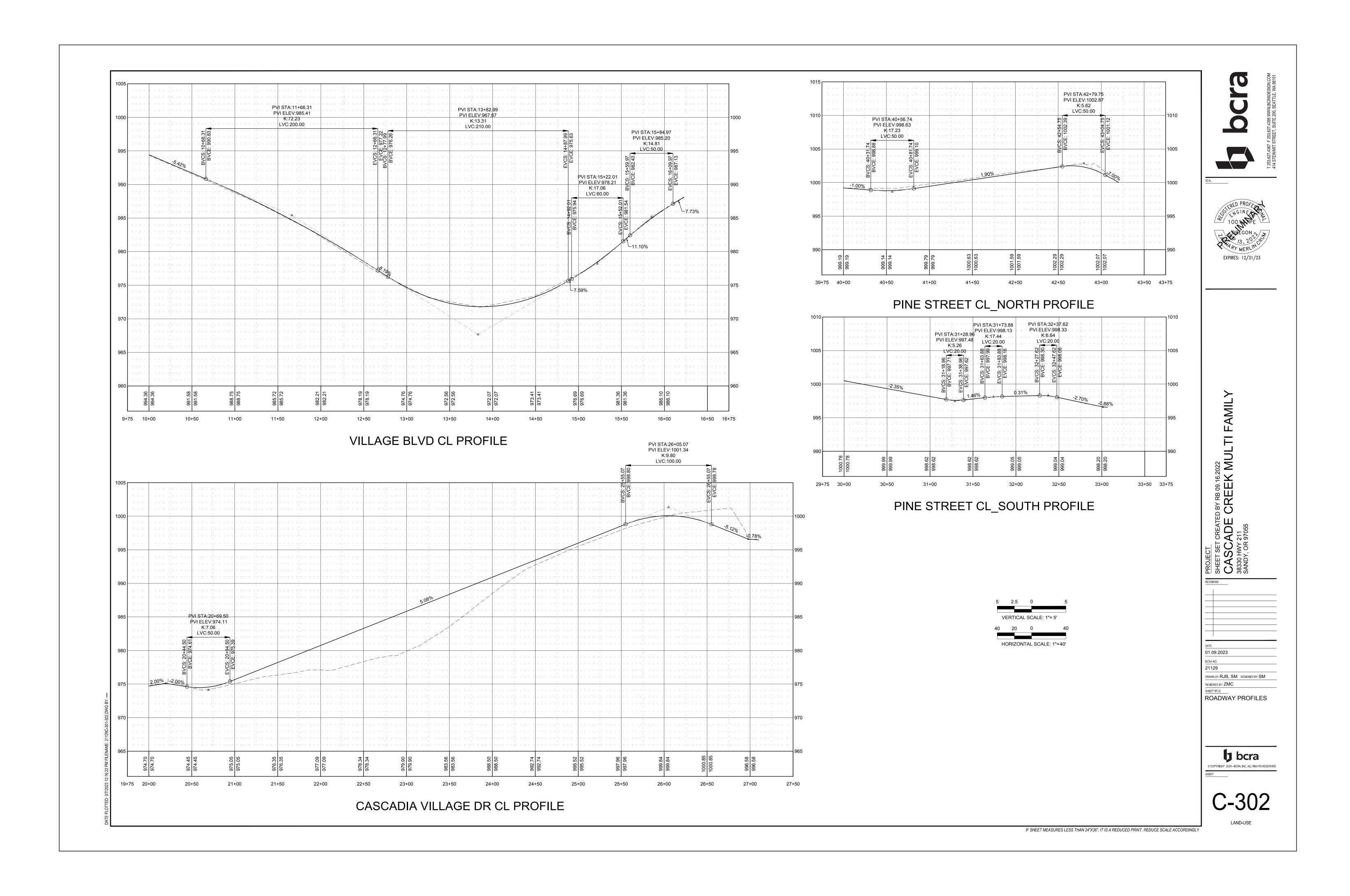

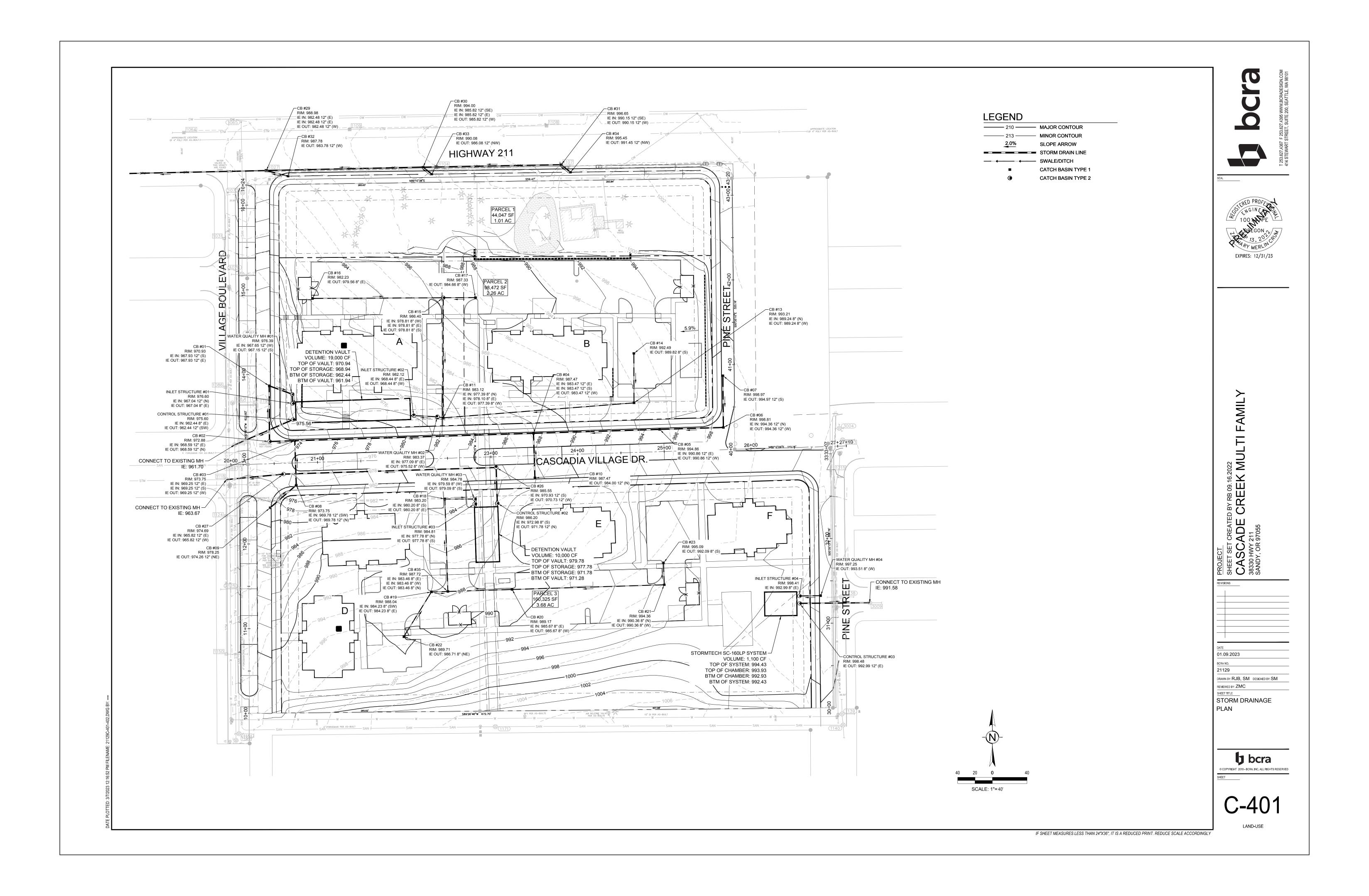

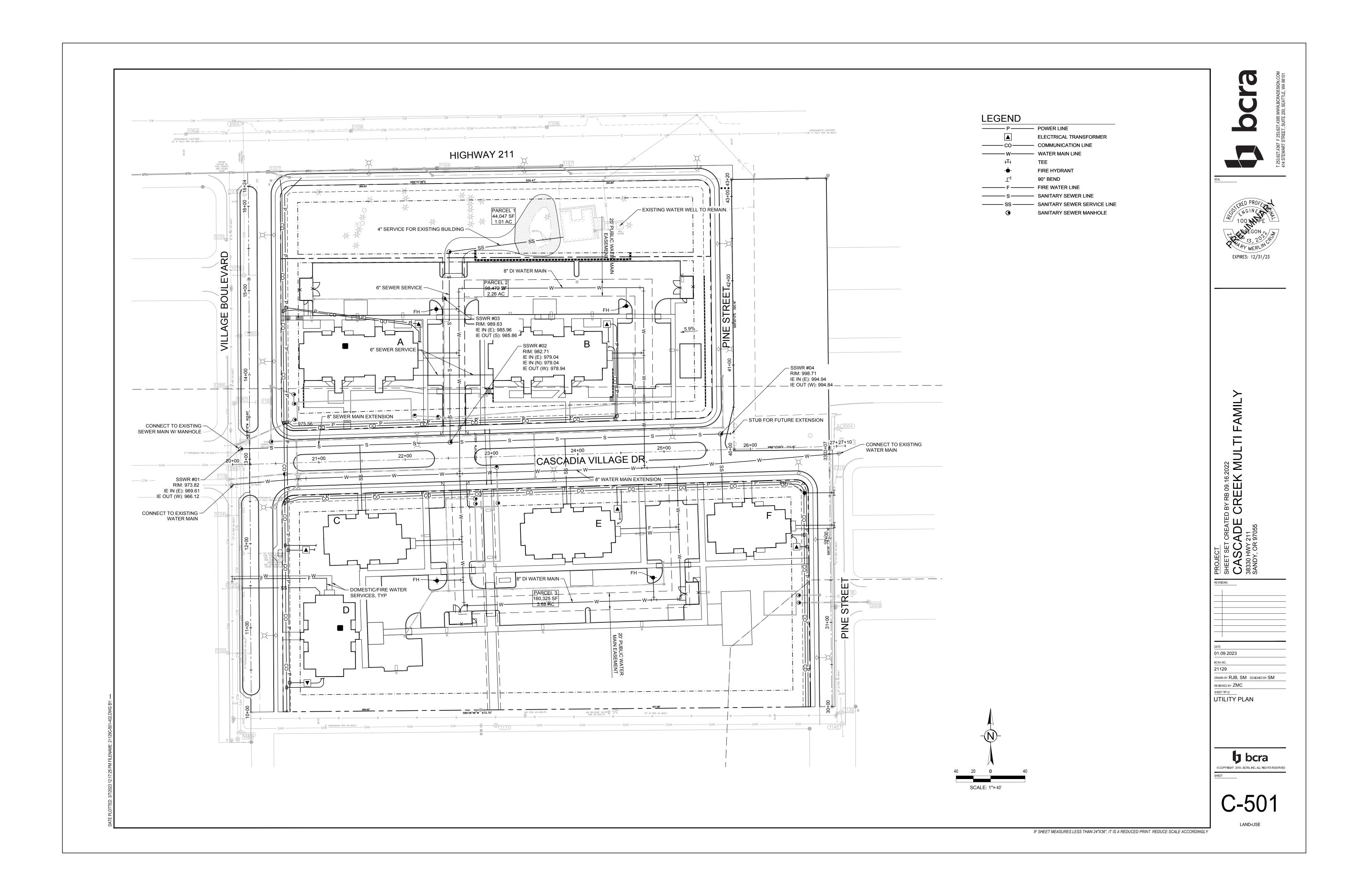
